RECOMMENDATIONS	<ul> <li>Director Debra Crowell reported that:</li> <li>The second quarter utility billing was due November 24, 2015.</li> <li>KVFD financial statements for March 31, 2015 were</li> </ul>
	ratified at a Joint Fire Services Committee meeting on November 19, 2015.
	Director Crowell added that <i>Schedules A and B</i> ( <i>Revenue and Expenditures</i> ) are included for the month and ended November 30, 2015. If revenue were averaged evenly over the year, 67% of the budget would be consumed. To November 30, 2015, overall revenue exceeds the average at 87.4% recorded. To date, overall expenses are above the average at 71.4% expended. Some department have exceeded the 67% guideline due to annual payments and bulk ordering of supplies. A written synopsis identifies the pertinent areas.

Overall, the <i>expenses</i> are projected to be over budget \$85,400. The Town Operating Fund is projecting a current surplus of \$147,100. A written synopsis identifies the pertinent areas.
Overall, actual <i>revenue</i> is projected to end the year over budget \$232,500. A written synopsis identifies the pertinent areas.
(2) Projections Director Crowell submitted a report on Projections as of November 30, 2015. The report said that at this early date, the Town of Kentville could realize a surplus of \$147,100(last month -\$99,300). All know expenses (as at today's date) are accrued.

Therefore, it was moved by Councilor Bill Boyd and seconded by Councilor Tony Bentley
Schedule G (Capital Investment Plan) shows the current status of the 2015/2016 capital projects. Projects to date are recorded at \$985,163 or about 48.4% of the adjusted budget. A written synopsis identifies the pertinent areas.
<i>Schedule D</i> is not included, however <i>Schedule E and F</i> ( <i>Perpetual Investment Fund</i> ) showed the Statement of Financial Position on October 31, 2015 total was \$13.3 million. While the Statement of Reserves to October 31, 2015 capital gains total \$8,645(last year-gain \$282,008).
<i>Schedule C (Summary of Outstanding Taxes)</i> The final tax levy was due September 30, 2015. 94.3% of the current levy is collected (last year -94.8%). Total property tax outstanding as of November 30, 2015 is \$6999, 392(last year-\$462,214). This equates to 92.3 % collected in total (last year-94.6%).

(1) Chief's Report
Inspector Darryl Brown presented the November report, on
behalf of Acting Chief Ken Reade , from which he noted that:
• There were a total of 186 shifts scheduled for the month of August, 29shifts (348hrs.) were lost due to leave and sick time.

• Sgt. Andrews is presently off on Workers Comp. as a
result of an injury from a year ago.
• The platoons conducted 151 hours of foot patrols in the
downtown core; they had 951hours of mobile patrols
resulting in 494 vehicle checks with 74 warnings issued
and 30 SOT's issued.
• 304 calls were received at 417, 59 being 911 calls, there
were 88 traffic offences reported with one being
unfounded, 11 cleared by charges and 72 were cleared
otherwise for 95.4% clearance rate.
• There were 12 MVA's for the month, 12 false alarms, 3
domestic calls and 23 calls relating to Mental Health
issues.

(1) Directors Report
Director Whynot reported that:

• A few more started in November, as the construction
season will soon come to a close any further work will
likely be limited to the first two weeks of December.
• Patching of our existing maintenance cuts and capital
projects will be completed by early December.
• Soon after the Industrial Park parcels were purchased by
the Town, arrangements were made to brush cut and clear some of the land to allow potential buyers to better see the
site and develop a sense of what might be possible at a
future time.
<ul> <li>This clearing will also facilitate future topographic</li> </ul>
surveys for later design, most likely by Staff.
• At this early stage potential lots can easily be created to a
potential buyer's needs.
• While the clearing equipment was on site, the access road
(Rockwell Drive) to the Industrial Park reservoir was
cleared to allow better accessibility to the site and to
allow maintenance of the utility lines.
• Several days of rain created problems for many residents
in November. Public Works crews were very busy trying
to keep ahead of the storm water while trying to address
washouts around town. Areas within the road right of

ways not completely reinstated and will be addressed in
the spring. The recent work by the Selvetion Army to address
• The recent work by the Salvation Army to address flooding in their area appears to have been successful.
Some backup still occurred but their latest site work did
very well at managing such a large volume of storm
water.

(f)Water Commission
(1) Directors Report
Director Whynot noted that:
• All measured parameters for the water utility were within
the acceptable limits set within our approval to operate.
• A meeting of the Kentville Water Commission was held
on November 02, 2015. The main subject of the meeting
was a discussion about the recommendation from the
Source Water Protection Committee regarding the
proposed expansion of the Valley Ford building in the
Industrial Park. This expansion received a positive recommendation.

• There were two minor service leaks in November on
Apple Crest Drive. These were both plastic service lines.
Although old they should still be good for some time,
hopefully not a sign of early deterioration. These would
have been installed prior to the Stead Agreement as
current standards require copper service lines to the
curbstops. Both leaks were quickly repaired by Staff.
• A minor pump controller problem was also experienced at
the Prospect Treatment Building but all services remained
in place.
• Planning of the leak detection and estimated life for 4
kilometers of water main within the town was completed
in November.
• The actual field work will be competed in December
which will assist with the planning of capital projects over
the next several years.
• We had some problems with our SCADA signals from the
Industrial Park Reservoir but took advantage of some
nearby brush and tree clearing to allow Aliant to come to
the site and replace the line. There has been no further
issues with the signals.
• Although late in the year, water services were extended
from River Street (at contractor's expense) to the new
facility of Kings Riverside Court Residences Ltd. Any
settlement or deficiencies will be corrected in the spring.

NEW BUSINESS	(a) Eco Kings Action Team Update – report The Eco-Kings Action Team has been an active committee dealing with regional sustainability issues in Kings County for more than a dozen years. The committee originally managed the Federal Government's One Tonne Challenge program followed by a series of local projects including anti-idling programs, sustainability fairs, a commuter rapid transit feasibility study, and promotion of a regional approach to sustainability among Kings County municipalities. Each of the four municipalities in Kings has a representative on the committee in addition to representatives from the Blomidon Naturalists, Nova Scotia Department of Natural Resources, Acadia University and Valley Waste.

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	As stated in the Actin Team mandate, revised January 8 <sup>th</sup> , 2014, the Eco-Kings Actin Team
	"champions environmental change with partners on a regional scope in Kings County" and "envisions a Kings County that provides environmentally and economically sustainable solutions [for] adapting to change and living in harmony with the natural environment."
	At its recent regular meeting held November 17, 2015, the committee discussed its future direction in the context of potential opportunities and challenges for municipalities posed by the new Federal Government's anticipated climate change policies.
	To effectively grasp opportunities and comply with senior government policy requirements, Eco-Kings recommends that each of the four Kings County municipal units form its own Sustainability Committee, if they have not already done so, to recommend climate change and sustainability plans specific to their own jurisdictions.
	Further, in the interests of coordinated regional action, Eco-Kings invites Councils to consider using the Eco-Kings table, when opportunities exist for more effective environmental action and financial advantages, as a forum where the individual sustainability committees can meet and discuss regionally significant issues.
	It is our hope that collaborative action among the municipal units in Kings County will lead to a healthier and more productive environment for all residents of Kings County.
